The ABCs of Web APIs

APIs or Application Programming Interfaces have become increasingly popular in academic research. They simplify data access, streamline data collection and analysis processes, enable real-time updates, support collaboration, provide access to specialized tools, and more.

HOW DO APIS WORK?

APIs serve as a set of rules and protocols that define how two software applications communicate with each other by "exposing" some of a program's internal functions to the outside world.

It can be compared to a formal contract outlining the interaction terms between these applications, specifying how they exchange requests (a.k.a. calls) and responses.

- Automated data collection
- More detailed and stable data retrieval
- Batch access to data
- Pull data in analysis-ready formats
- Real-time updates
- Access to time-series data
- Custom analytical tools
- Integration with R and Python

WHERE CAN I FIND THEM?

Databases and websites typically list their API documentation on a dedicated developers' webpage. Always check if an API is available before considering other approaches to access data.

INTERACTING WITH APIS


